Beginning this week, we will introduce idioms and do a variety of activities with them.

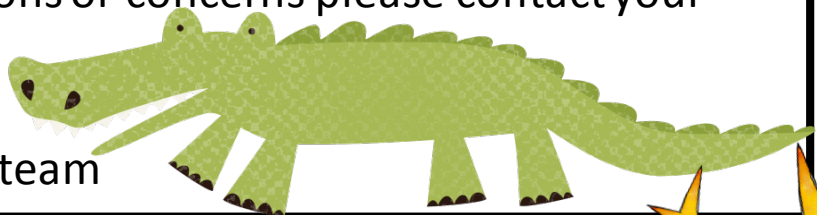
